**GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS.** If all requirements are not completed within six years after admission, the student is expected to conform to the Undergraduate Bulletin requirements specified for the year in which graduation is anticipated. To graduate, students must earn a minimum of 120 semester hours in the specified curriculum, with a cumulative grade point average of 2.00 or better for all courses taken.

WITHDRAWALS/REPEATS. Students are limited to 16 credits of W's throughout their entire degree. Withdrawals count as course attempts. In addition, a maximum of 16 credits can be repeated throughout a student's entire degree. After 16 hours of repeated credits, failure to pass a required course means a student must change her/his major; no additional repeated courses are allowed in any major.
